





## Mapping Graded Care Profile 2 (GCP2) Grades

## on to Surrey's Effective Family Resillience Model

The following table shows how the grades from GCP2 translate on to Surrey's Effective Family Resilience Model and the subsequent responses that should be considered for each grade. Please note:

- The RAG rating below correlates to the GCP2 grade descriptors, not the RAG ratings within the Surrey Effective Support Windscreen.
- How you make referrals to other services, does not change as a result of the following.
- If there are concerns about domestic abuse, parental mental health or substance misuse, please consider whether an adult safeguarding referral to Surrey Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub is required.

1 & 2	No Neglectful Parenting:	Normal universal access to services. Further assessment as and when indicated	UNIVERSAL SERVICES
	Consistent good quality parenting where the child's needs are always paramount or priority		
3	Mild Neglect: Failure to provide care in one or two	Usually does not warrant a Request for Support but might require a single agency targeted short term intervention or potentially Early Help Assessment until resolved.	UNIVERAL SERVICES/ EARLY HELP
	areas of basic needs, but most of the time a good quality of care is provided across the majority of the domains	May need to escalate concerns if there is no evidence of the care improving over a 6-month period.	EARLY HELP
4	Moderate Neglect:  Failure to provide good quality care across a number of the child's needs most of the time. Can occur when less intrusive measures such as single	Requires a multi-agency coordinated intervention, potentially with Early Help Assessment or at a Child in Need level for further support where needed. All cases need formal monitoring for referral to children's services if the care does not improve.	TARGETED HELP / SPECIALIST

5	Severe Neglect:  Failure to provide good quality care across a number of the child's needs	Where care is grade 5 in more than one area, a Request for Support form should be submitted.  If the child is subject to child protection arrangements, then	TARGETED HELP / SPECIALIST
	all of the time. Occurs when severe or long-term harm has been or is likely to be caused to the child, or where the	the GCP2 should be repeated for each review or as agreed.	SPECIALIST
